#### ONGOING RESEARCH DEVELOPMENT SERVICES

Mentored Proposal Development (MPD): Designed to complement internal and external reviews (above), mentored proposal development walks new investigators through the development of a new grant in a series of one-on-one consultations. Investigators work closely with me to (1) identify what information goes into each section of a grant, and (2) design projects that are responsive and appropriately scoped. This allows field-specific experts to focus on science rather than grantsmanship.

One Time Grant Review: Like the MPD, these reviews are designed as a complement to the internal and external review. I primarily look for issues in clarity, cogent argumentation, alignment with agency mission statements and any of the non-scientific errors I've written about. I also work with the scientific feedback provided by internal and external reviewers to work towards solutions-based feedback.

<u>Resubmission Consultation</u>: Studies simultaneously show that grants and publications tend to score better on resubmission, but that underrepresented groups resubmit less often. This means a greater burden on women and minoritized groups. This service includes two one-on-one consultations. In the first I work with scholars to review summary statements and create a plan for revisions. In the second, I review the grant

application (with summary statements and one-page response letter) for clear responsiveness to reviewer feedback.

<u>Workshop</u>: grant writing for the social and health sciences: A four-part workshop devoted to understanding the grants submission process and writing NIH grants. Sessions are structured around:

- a. Understanding the NIH, FOAs, POs, study section and the review process
- b. Constructing your aims page
- c. Framing your research (significance and innovation)
- d. Methods
  - \*\*Can be offered online
  - \*\*Can be offered in person to around 10 faculty at a time

Resubmission Round Table: A cross-disciplinary group of around N faculty members with scored or triaged NIH grant applications. We meet N+1 times. In meeting 1, we address general questions about resubmission. Each subsequent session is focused on an individual investigator and helping them construct a responsive resubmission.

<u>Specific Aims Workshops</u>: Participants are divided into groups of 4 - 5 faculty usually with cross-division representation. Each month a group member will bring in an aims page, a paper pitch, or a project idea. Fellow group members and Dr. Mikal provide feedback.

<u>Working groups</u>: The NIH frequently issues NOSIs or other broad initiatives (e.g., surrounding SDM, implementation science, stakeholder engagement, racial disparities, and climate change). Leveraging contacts across campus, I will put together a targeted list of potentially interested faculty who represent potential topical expertise, data resources, or methodological expertise. Previous topics include: domestic abuse, climate change, and reconstructing historical climate data from non-traditional data sources.

<u>Incentive Programs</u>: I have helped to create, implement, and advertise incentive programs that include funds for grant submissions, funds for resubmissions, overhead kickback programs, and large and small departmental awards designed to provide pilot data.

<u>Insider Luncheons</u>: In this monthly lunch event, we invite local faculty and investigators who have reviewed for, worked with or who have been funded by various agencies through various mechanisms. Each month was devoted a different agency / foundation (NIH, NSF, RWJF / or foundations in general) and "insiders" share information about how to make contact with agency officials, how to secure funding, how the review process works and other information to help prepare the best, most responsive applications.

<u>Mock Review Panels / Review Panel Panels</u>: I have convened experienced reviewers from the NIH (NSF and NEH) to provide insights into the panel review process. We have structured this as both a mock review panel. In one, panelists provide scores and discuss as they would in a regular review panel. In a second, panelists are provided various talking points and field questions from audience members.
